Background

The University of Oklahoma Health Sciences Center (OUHSC) is a comprehensive academic health center comprised of 7 distinct colleges housing over 80 health degree programs. Unity Clinic is a student-run interprofessional clinic that is housed under the OUHSC Office of Interdisciplinary Programs. Following Emergency FDA approval of the Pfizer and Moderna COVID-19 vaccines, OU Health, the adjunct hospital system to OUHSC, was designated as a strategic community partner to help distribute the vaccine. The OU Health COVID-19 working group then recognized the educational and interdisciplinary value that the vaccine initiative could provide for healthcare students. As a result, student leaders of Unity Clinic were contacted to coordinate student volunteer recruitment, training, and on-site clinic operations for the COVID-19 vaccine clinics.


Methodology

Volunteer Recruitment

Upon notification of its involvement in the vaccine initiative, Unity Clinic sent a campus-wide call for volunteers to students currently and previously involved with Unity Clinic. This email included an interest form for students to complete. A subsequent email list was developed for further correspondence to students who indicated interest.

Volunteer Training

- All volunteers were required to complete an online training course and competency quiz demonstrating their general knowledge of the COVID-19 vaccines, administration route, and common associated side effects prior to volunteering for the first time.
- Clinical students were required to attend an additional didactic training and certification in order to administer vaccine injections.



Supply Acquisition

The COVID-19 vaccines were supplied by the Oklahoma State Department of Health. All other vaccine supplies, medical equipment, and clinic facilities were supplied by OU Health.

Involvement

In total, **375 student** volunteers participated in months in COVID-19 vaccine clinics from January to mid-July of 2021.

• <u>Three highest</u> percentages of student volunteers: COM-MS (60.0%), CON (11.2%), and COP (8.8%)



Continued Work

Unity Clinic expanded its interprofessional efforts by partnering with local community leaders to meet the needs of communities with the greatest health disparities and lowest vaccination rates. Working alongside organizations with a history of community support and trust, we made COVID-19 vaccines more convenient and accessible. Our transition from large scale operations to small scale clinics opens doors for future partnerships to address additional healthcare needs and health disparities.

Identifying Community Partners

Over 400 people in our community have been vaccinated at Unity Clinic vaccination clinics hosted at food resource centers, back to school events, food drop offs, community health fairs, and religious services. This has created an interprofessional, practice-based experience that empowers students to improve community health. This work will also serve as a foundation for future community outreach clinics through established infrastructure and local partnerships.


